Dear Beloved of Emmaus,

In the span of this month of March, we will go from Lent to Holy Week to Easter. The calendar will go from winter to spring. It's hard to know whether the spring peepers will be singing in the vernal pools by the end of

the month or if bulbs will be rising by then, but we know that Easter is coming.

In these days of Lent, it is good to pause and reflect on how God is present in our lives. God's desire is ALWAYS to grant new life. We are a resurrection people, trusting in the One who conquers death through the cross and empty tomb. This is especially true even when we face the brokenness of sorrow, the chaos of sudden changes, or unexpected challenges. God fiercely and tenderly loves us – and companions us through all things.

Even in the darkest of days after Pastor Tim died, God was made real to me in the caring and kindness of others, and the prayers and support, especially from so many of you here at Emmaus. As we companion each other through sorrow and joy, we live out life as the

people of God, the body of Christ. We witness to the good news of the resurrection as we share hope, grant mercy, and speak to how God can and will, through Jesus, bring about healing, courage, and new possibilities.

One of the optional readings for Ash Wednesday included these words from Isaiah 58:

The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail.

Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you will be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in. (vv.11-12).

For us, Jesus restores the breach between God and our brokenness. And we, in turn, by the power of God, can bring a message of restoration to others through our

words and actions. This is the good news the world longs for...and we can share.

The Intern's Corner



Tom's Letter & Congregation Meeting



Dear Emmaus Family,

It is exciting that Amy is able to do her Pastoral Internship here at Emmaus. Amy has become an important part of our church family and her ministry here at Emmaus is a tremendous blessing to our church.

The Church Council has learned that there are financial requirements for Internship congregations. The congre-

gation's financial obligations include a stipend, car expenses, and an internship fee. The Luther Seminary requires that these expenses be paid by the congregation where the internship is being performed.

These expenses total about \$14,000.00 for this year. This amount includes \$12,000.00 stipend and \$2,000.00 in Seminary fees and travel expense. While part of this expense will come back to the church in an increase in tithing from Amy, it is still an expense that will be paid out of church funds and the Congregation will need to vote on the expense.

The Church Council has called a Special Congregation Meeting on Sunday, March 10, 2024, after worship to vote on this expenditure. If you have any questions, please reach out to myself or any council member.

Correction to Synod Sunday Giving

Last November, Emmaus observed Synod Sunday in order to support the ministry of the New England Synod and the ELCA. In addition to our annual pledge for Congregational Mission support of \$5,100, Emmaus raised an additional \$1,095 (this may have misreported to the congregation as \$595). Funds received are used in New England (approx. 65%) for starting new and supporting existing congregations including call processes, and other funds (35%) are sent on to the ELCA for global mission, seminaries, and outreach.

At the Annual Meeting in January, the congregation approved an expenditure of up to \$15,000 from the Maintenance Reserve Fund to install a new roof

at the parsonage. Wasting no time, the Property Committee already made it happen! The roof was replaced in February at a cost of \$11,250 plus \$400 for re-flashing the chimney. The architectural shingles are warrantied for 50 years, and the workmanship is guaranteed for 10 years. It looks great!

New insulation has been installed in the attic and basement areas. Waterproofing improvements in the basement are almost completed with a reconfiguration of the laundry area. Be sure to thank Wayne C., Bob G., Scott W., Dick M. and Gerry B. for all their time and efforts to renovating the parsonage.

Emmaus in Action


The Souper Bowl of Caring netted \$260 cash and over 100 food items for St. Luke's Food Pantry. Wow! In addition, the Dolls of Hope

Rocking the Artwork

Celestial Delights

The month of March is named for the planet Mars, and used to be the first month of the year back in the early Roman calendar over 2,500 years ago.

March marks the return of Spring when we observe the vernal equinox, this year on March 19th. The vernal and autumnal equinoxes are the only two days each year that the sun rises due east and sets due west for everyone on Earth except at the poles. That's nearly EVERYONE!

March is packed full of celestial highlights and next month will be even more dramatic with the long-awaited total solar eclipse passing right over northern Maine, the first one since July 20, 1963. The moon will pass in front of the sun on April 8th, casting a wide swath of Maine into utter darkness. Maine is uniquely situated for a front-row seat to this rare astronomical phenomenon.

The next total solar eclipse over Maine after this one will not be until May 1, 2079. That's a span of 114 years! So you won't want to miss it—a once in a lifetime opportunity to be within the path of totality in several northern counties in Maine. It is good time to pause and reflect on just how many ways God is present in our lives.

Also, don't forget that Daylight Saving Time begins on Sunday, March 10th at 2:00 a.m. Spring forward so as not to miss worship!
