Into this very real chaos, we hear again the Easter story. Jesus, risen and alive, appears not with thunder or spectacle, but by walking quietly alongside two confused and grieving disciples on the road to Emmaus. They do not recognize Him at first. But as they speak honestly about their sorrow and fear, Christ listens. He walks with them. He explains the Scriptures. And in the breaking of bread, their eyes are opened, and their hearts burn with new understanding.

This story reminds us that we are not alone on this journey. Even in our most anxious and uncertain moments-as individuals and as a community-Christ is with us. He meets

Mother's Day Worship – May 11: A time to honor those who have nurtured us in love and faith—whether mothers by birth or by spirit.


David Backman Memorial Service – May 17: We will gather and honor our beloved David at 11am.

A Lord's Prayer for Justice

Our Father . . . who always stands with the weak, the powerless, the poor, the abandoned, the sick, the aged, the very young, the unborn, and those who, by victim of circumstance, bear the heat of the day.

Who art in heaven . . . where everything will be reversed, where the first will be last and the last will be first, but where all will be well and every manner of being will be well.

Hallowed be thy name . . . may we always acknowledge your holiness, respecting that your ways are not our ways, your standards are not our standards. May the reverence we give your name pull us out of the selfishness that prevents us from seeing the pain of our neighbor.

Your kingdom come . . . help us to create a world where, beyond our own needs and hurts, we will do justice, love tenderly, and walk humbly with you and each other.

Your will be done . . . open our freedom to let you in so that the complete mutuality that characterizes your life might flow through our veins and thus the life that we help generate may radiate your equal love for all and your special love for the poor.

On earth as in heaven . . . may the work of our hands, the temples and structures we build in this world, reflect the temple and the structure of your glory so that the joy, graciousness, tenderness, and justice of heaven will show forth within all of our structures on earth.

Give . . . life and love to us and help us to see always everything as gift. Help us to know that nothing comes to us by right and that we must give because we have been given to. Help us realize that we must give to the poor, not because they need it, but because our own health depends upon our giving to them.

Us . . . the truly plural us. Give not just to our own but to everyone, including those who are very different than the narrow us. Give your gifts to all of us equally.

This day . . . not tomorrow. Do not let us push things off into some indefinite future so that we can continue to live justified lives in the face of injustice because we can make good excuses for our inactivity.

Our daily bread ... so that each person in the world may have enough food, enough clean water, enough clean air, adequate health care, and sufficient access to education so as to have the sustenance for a healthy life. Teach us to give from our sustenance and not just from our surplus.

And forgive us our trespasses . . . forgive us our blindness toward our neighbor, our self-preoccupation, our racism, our sexism, and our incurable propensity to worry only about ourselves and our own. Forgive us our capacity to watch the evening news and do nothing about it.

As we forgive those who trespass against us ...forgive those who victimize us. Help us to mellow out in spirit, to not grow bitter with age, to forgive the imperfect parents and systems that wounded, cursed, and ignored us.

And do not put us to the test ... do not judge us only by whether we have fed the hungry, given clothing to the naked, visited the sick, or tried to mend the systems that victimized the poor. Spare us this test for none of us can stand before your gospel scrutiny. Give us, instead, more days to mend our ways, our selfishness, and our systems.

But deliver us from evil . . . that is, from the blindness that lets us continue to participate in anonymous systems within which we need not see who gets less as we get more. Amen.

Carol Carlton Gift to Emmaus



It is with great joy that we report to the congregation that Emmaus has been gifted a large sum of money from Carol Carlton's estate. Carol's Last Will named Emmaus Lutheran Church as one of the beneficiaries of her estate. Emmaus' share of the estate is roughly \$416,000.

This is a great and generous gift from Carol to our

church. These funds will ensure that our church is sound and strong for many years to come. Committee members of Emmaus will make sure there will be a special way to memorialize Carol and also her trustee, Andre, for this very special gift for our church.

Last month Tom, Ron, and our Treasurer Erik, opened a 9month Certificate of Deposit at our banking institution for \$416,985 at an interest rate of 3.8%. This will allow interest returns and also give some time for the Congregation Council, members of the congregation, the Finance Committee, and the Stewardship Committee to discuss how to best generate maximum returns on this investment.

We thank God for the legacy of Carol Carlton and this wonderful gift for our church. Carol, you will not be forgotten!

Update—MEMA Grant Funds



If you recall in March, Emmaus was informed that the federal administration of grant funds had been "paused." This prompted a Special Meeting of the Congregation which took place on March 30th to fund our parking lot project in the event that the Maine Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) did not reimburse those funds under the grant (which passed unanimously). Here is the latest up-

date from MEMA from April 22:

"FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security will resume processing grant payments using the procedures in place before the manual review process began. Following a brief

catch-up period for MEMA, this means a return to "normal" business practices and (hopefully) payment processing times. *Applicants and subrecipients can expect to start seeing reimbursement of previously submitted invoices* as early as this week." [Emphasis added]

Emmaus submitted an invoice to MEMA for the security camera installation, and just this week Emmaus received a check for \$6,997 reimbursement. Good news! The last invoice, which will be the largest one for the parking lot lighting improvements project, is slated for summer. Scott Wiemer has already submitted the Site Plan Review with the town. Under the terms of the grant, Emmaus



must pay upfront for any work performed and then seek reimbursement through MEMA. If/when Emmaus receives reimbursement on invoices already submitted, there should be no problem getting reimbursed for the parking lot project, but we'll keep you posted! David Backman Memorial—May 17th

If you recall, David gave a riveting presentation at a Bean Supper last September about Casco Bay prehistory and his 8-year archeology dig on Casco Bay Island. Last year, Emmaus was able to sponsor 6 kids attending summer camp (\$700 apiece), in addition to a \$1,050 contribution to the Calumet Sponsorship Fund (for a total contribution of \$5,250). This year we have our own Danica Hallen who will attend Calumet as a CIT (Councilor in Training). Way to go, Danica!

We collect donations all year round and we appreciate all of you who donate. We still need several volunteers to work the day of, and especially need help cleaning up and boxing up the unsold items. Please let Jencie Gerwig know if you can help (774-4872).
