We both spoke of our fondness for hydrangeas, which she certainly seems to have an abundance of in her yard. # Welcome the Season of Pentecost

## “Go Tell the World About Me”



After his death, Jesus stayed with his disciples for a little while on earth before returning to the Father, and we can only imagine what Jesus might have said to them during this time (“Go tell the world about me,” perhaps?). It was the time of transition that took place from Jesus’ time on earth after his

Resurrection and before his Holy Ascension, and then the time of the beginning of the early church. In present day, this time is known as the season of Pentecost, or the time of the Church—the time we focus on growing together in the life of the Holy Trinity. That’s why during this season the church is decorated in green, the color of growing plants. This marks the season of growth in living in our Baptism and receiving the Lord’s Word and Sacraments.

On the first Sunday after Pentecost, the Church celebrates Holy Trinity Sunday (this year it is June 4th). We are baptized into only one name, but that name is “of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.” There is only one name, only one God-but there are three persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. On this Sunday we confess the great mystery of the Holy Trinity. *“Now, go tell the world about me!”*

Income for April was solid, near the budgeted amount and similar to previous April. Expenses over budget for April resulted in ~\$2,500 monthly deficit, but no cause for concern—multiple expense overages for the biannual property tax bill, salary catch-up amounts, NE Synod support and one extra cleaning were paid. YTD remains in the black due to the pre-payment of several annual pledges.
