
Happy (early) Reformation Day! Reformation Day is memorialized on October 31st every year and will be commemorated during worship on Sunday, October 29th. As Lutherans, this is an important day in our

church calendar because it marks the onset of the Reformation. The core contention Luther makes which in part sparks the reformation is that the word of God is in fact God. Meaning that the Bible is the word of God because in it, Jesus, who is the word incarnate, comes to us.

What was so shocking about Luther's assertions at the time and those who held the same convictions, was that it challenged not only the conventional thinking, but also the power structure of the prevailing

Roman Catholic church. Every theological position Luther took from his 95 theses and forward only served to to be Lutheran. We can worship openly and freely beadd kindling to that friction that stoked the reformation and the passion for those who wanted religious change. Luther's theology took away any go between needed between us (humans) and God because he held the priesthood of all believers as truth. Additionally, communion ultimately became one of the most debated

parts of Luther's theology, departing from the Catholic belief in transubstantiation. Luther believed Jesus is among the elements and that the laity can handle and consume them because Luther asserts that communion is something God does for us.



The reformation could not have gained as much traction if Luther and like-minded theologians of the time did not work to document, argue over, and defend the theological ideas initially put forward by Luther. They were revolutionary for the time. The confessions, catechisms, creeds, were all created to assert, clarify and defend the Lutheran faith. All of these early doctrines are combined into the Book of Concord so that there would be an established authoritative record for other Lutherans to refer to and fol-

So, this Reformation Day, remember it is our privilege cause of those brave theologians who came before us. The liturgical color of Reformation Day is red representing fire and spirit (scholars also say for martyrdom). Remember to wear red on Reformation Sunday, October 29th to show your Lutheran pride!

Road Map to Our Call Process



Update on the Call Process

Council has put together a timeline of how long it should be before we introduce our next pastor to the congregation.

We have already completed the Church Assessment Tool (or CAT). Over 50 surveys were completed!

Late September/early October, the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) committee will be formed and initial work on the profile will begin.

Early October the results of the CAT survey will be interpreted at an online meeting **on October 4th at 6:30 p.m.** via Zoom. The Rev. Sara Anderson, a NE Synod representative, will lead the meeting and all are welcome to attend. Please call the church office if you would like the Zoom link at (207) 781-4820.

The next meeting of the Congregation Council is October 10th and a Call Committee will be finalized. If you know someone who you would like to recommend or if you would like to be on the Call Committee, please let any one of the council members know, or contact Tom Duchesneau, (207) 781-4820.

Saturday, November 4th, there will be a luncheon meeting of the congregation from 10:00 a.m.—2:00 p.m. where we will have our own discussion about the CAT results. Here you will be able to give your opinion of what we are doing right at our church, and what needs improvement. We can talk about the future of our church, and who you want our next pastor to be. This meeting is your chance to speak up about our church and our next pastor. And the best part will be the food!


Mid to late November, the MSP Committee finalizes the Ministry Site Profile. In late November, the Council approves the Ministry Site Profile which is then forwarded to the Synod.

This is a busy and aggressive schedule, but our congregation has always come together when the real work needs to be done. And hopefully our kickoff of the Call Committee in December will yield early results!

Fun Facts

There are 8 more Sundays left in the Season of Pentecost which officially brings a close to the church year. Reformation Sunday this year is October 29th, a day to commemo-

rate when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church in the city of Wittenberg over 500 years ago. Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michealangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new



university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures.

Reformation Sunday this year is October 29th where we commemorate Martin Luther. Don't forget to wear red to church!

Confirmation Sunday

There's another special event taking place on Reformation Sunday. Emmaus will witness the Rite of Confirmation for two of our teens. These dedicated youth have participated in confirmation classes over the last several years and will affirm their baptism on Sunday, October 29th. Security Grant Awarded to Emmaus

If you recall last September, the congregation voted to approve the installation of upgraded security lighting in the parking lot, along with the installation of several security cameras. Funds for these projects were contingent upon receiving a grant through the Department of Homeland Security and the Maine **Emergency Management** Agency (MEMA). Wayne Chadbourne recently let us know that our grant application had

been approved in the



amount of \$53,867. God be praised! These projects will improve preparedness and response capabilities not only for Emmaus but for homeland security related incidents in the State of Maine.

Hopefully by the end of the year, we may be able to start coordination for these large projects. The grant funding is available through August 31, 2026. This winter we should be able to address needed door replacement at the rear entrance of the building, and the new lighting and security cameras may be slated for spring/summer, 2024.

ship. All effort will be made to put together a schedule for the upcoming months. Please let Beverly in the office know of your availability at beverly@emmausfalmouth.org.


Mittens, Mittens...
